1	The "Rules for Safe Gun Handling" apply to air rifle shooting and not to other types of guns.	T or <u>E</u>
2	On target ranges, the safest direction to point a gun muzzle is downrange or up towards the ceiling.	<u>I</u> or F
3	No one is authorized to fire a shot until the command START is given, even if the command LOAD has already been given.	<u>I</u> or F
